HELP FIGHT THE PURPLE INVADERS!

We are organizing to fight purple loosestrife on Lake Nebagamon and we need your help! We need people to sign up now for a program that will begin with a training next spring. Farrah Wirtz UW Extension will provide a free training in May/June 2015 on how to grow purple loosestrife, raise beetles, and release them. Volunteers would need space for a kiddie pool and would be required to attend the training. They would then raise the beetles for a month or so before releasing them. All equipment is free and will be provided. The beetles will be released in August. If you are interested please contact Farrah Wirtz at (715) 394-8334.

Though Purple Loosestrife is almost certainly here to stay in Wisconsin, we should be able to efficiently protect our wetland ecosystems from domination by Purple Loosestrife by simply restoring some of the natural checks and balances that can result in diverse, healthy environments.

Purple Loosestrife is an invasive wetland plant that can produce millions of seeds every year. It can take over wetlands and force out native plants and animals. If you have Purple Loosestrife on your property, biocontrol may be the most viable long-term control method, promising to greatly reduce the need for other more costly and disruptive control methods such as yearly herbicide application. Biocontrol uses purple loosestrife's natural predator, the Galerucella beetle, to control it. Careful research has shown that these insects are dependent on Purple Loosestrife, are not a threat to other plants, and they effectively decrease purple loosestrife's size and seed output-allowing native species to flourish.

Walleye Initiative Report Fall 2014

1. Stocking: There are no plans to stock Lake
Nebagamon this fall. Last year's stocking amounted to
16,000 extended growth walleyes (EGW 6-7 inch range)
at 16/acre. The DNR plan for 2015 is stocking15,000
EGW. Scott Toshner, DNR Fisheries Biologist, indicates

there is evidence through continuous stocking, one age class can have an impact on the other age class, thus an every other year stocking plan. Since this community contributed funds towards stocking in 2011 and 2012, we support this every other year schedule.

2. DNR Spring 2014 Survey: Results indicate the stocking has contributed significantly to the walleye year classes, especially in the young year classes and that natural reproduction is still evident. The adult walleye population is up somewhat from previous surveys. Adult smallmouth and largemouth bass population has decreased from past surveys- which has been confirmed by several fishermen's reports.

3. Fishsticks: A project is planned for this coming winter. The Feb 2014 project had to be postponed due to bad snow and ice conditions on the lake and is rescheduled for Feb 2015. Scott Toshner is contacting all those lakeshore property owners in the project, confirming the project is on go and that the sites are adequately marked for the placement of the fishsticks (trees). 4. WISCONSIN'S HEALTHY LAKES INITIATIVE. This is a new project initiated as part of our Walleye Improvement Initiative supported and approved by the Nebagamon Lake Association Board. This Statewide Healthy Lakes Implementation is sponsored by the Wisconsin DNR Fisheries. Planning and funding may be available for these projects. It is directed at lakeshore/shoreline restoration. This was introduced at our summer Lake Association Annual Meeting. Thus far 9 lakeshore property owners have signed up to participate. Attached is a brief description of this lakeshore/shoreline restoration initiative.

WISCONSIN'S HEALTHY LAKES IMPLEMENTATION PLAN*

A new project in the Lake Nebagamon Walleye Improvement Initiative – Lakeshore Restoration This statewide Healthy Lakes Implementation Plan, as proposed by the Wisconsin DNR includes relatively simple and inexpensive best lakeshore practices that lakefront property owners can implement themselves to help make healthy lakes for current and future generations.

This plan includes funding for the promotion, planning, establishment, accountability and evaluation of such practices for implementing lakeshore habitat restoration and erosion and runoff control.

The target audience for this plan and implementation of the associated practices is the individual lakefront property owners, including: permanent and seasonal homeowners, municipalities, and businesses.

A grouping of applicants can/may be required on a particular lake plan.

*This is the main criteria proposed for this program. This Lakeshore Restoration Project has the support and approval of the Nebagamon Lake Association.

LAKE NEBAGAMON BOAT LAUNCH SUMMARY 2014

This year our monitoring of the lake did not start until May 10th due to late ice-out for the second straight year. Once again monitoring continued through Labor Day on September 1st. We monitored only weekends until May 26th, when we began monitoring 7 days (53 hours) per week.

We used 4 primary monitors. They were Jeff Giansanti, Judy Dalbec, Olivia Amber and Victoria Schmidt. They were once again backed up by William Cain. Our monitors were very thorough in their approach with emphasis on live wells, drain plugs and any vegetation on boats or trailers. We also tried to

focus on any boats that had been in other water bodies during the past 5 days.

There were 166 work shifts completed by our monitors. This was 20 more shifts than ever before because we expanded coverage on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from mid-July onward. Wages paid were \$6,730. Additional costs for workers' compensation, FICA withholding and monitor T-shirts came to \$1,168.

We monitored 1,789 boats (334 more boats than any prior year). There were 1,162 boats entering the lake and 627 boats leaving the lake. There were 164 boats that had been in another lake within the previous 5 days, of which 56 had been in a lake or river identified as having zebra mussel or Eurasian Milfoil problems or both issues as identified by the Wisconsin or Minnesota DNR. These 56 boats were screened very carefully and their occupants were advised why we were conducting more vigorous scrutiny. Again, we had no violations and the number of people contacted was 3,268 (approximately 1.8 people per boat).

2014 Lake Nebagamon Water Quality By Mark Laskowski

This year started with a late spring followed by a cool summer. We also had high water at the beginning of the summer and at the end. With the cool summer temperatures the overall water temperatures were also down this year. According to Seicchi disk readings water clarity is still in decline this year. Lake Nebagamon is

classified as a Mesotrophic lake that has moderately clear water with increasing chance of low dissolved oxygen in the deep water during the summer. The Trophic State Index Graph on the Wis.DNR web site show that the phosphorus levels are higher than they were in 2013 but were below 2012 and 2011 levels. The graph also showed that chlorophyll levels are on the decline with levels that were last seen in 2008.

More Invasives—by David Conley

Two other invasive exotic plants have established themselves in the Lake Nebagamon area. These plants, the Common or Glossy Buckthorn and Japanese Knotweed, are already abundant and spreading rapidly. This is the best time of year to go after the buckhorn as the leaves are still dark green and some of the trees/bushes have glossy black berries. Cutting down the plants/trees is not a final answer but will set the trees back and prevent the berries from being spread next year.
