

**Water Quality Report** 

Lake Nebagamon had ice up occur on Nov 20, 2018, which was 18 days earlier than last year. The ice fully went off the lake on April 25, 2019, ten days earlier than last year.

The average secchi disk readings (water clarity) for 2019 have been 5.5 feet, which is similar to last year. Unfortunately, looking at historical data, 5.5 is on the lower end of the scale. 10 years ago, the five year running average for secchi disk readings was just under 8 feet. As always, water samples have been taken already a couple times in 2019 and sent to the lab for further analysis. We will report back results in the Fall newsletter.

#### **AIS Boat Launch Monitoring**

This year's boat monitoring for invasive species started on the weekend after fishing opener on Saturday, May 4th. We normally monitor 11 hours a day from 7am to 6pm on Saturdays and Sunday's only until Memorial Day weekend. Starting after Memorial Day we normally monitor 7 days a week. This is a total of 53 hours a week (5 hours/day Monday-Thursday and 11 hours/day Friday, Saturday and Sunday). This is the same number of hours as previous years.

Our main monitor this year is Jeff Giansanti. Jeff is starting his 6th year working for us and he covers the 11 hour shifts on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. He also covers the 11 hour shifts on our 3 holidays (Memorial Day, 4th of July and Labor Day). Jeff has also helped us this year by covering some additional time as we have needed.

Andrew Nelson, a Senior at Northwestern, will be working five hour shifts this Summer (1-6 Monday-Thursday). Thanks to additional funding from the Village and generous donations from members, Andrew will be covering mornings for each of his shifts in July also. We will be testing these times to determine average boat launch activity. Andrew has also helped numerous local residents with miscellaneous household projects over the last couple years.

William Cain, who has monitored for us in the past has filled in for us 2 days to date and will help us out as we have needs and/or if he is able.

Dave Sprowls has been leading our boat launch monitoring for many years, and is continuing to do so. Mark Laskowski has agreed to act as his backup and is being trained in this year.

Jeff, Andrew, Mark, and Dave met in Iron River this Spring for a two hour intensive training course put on by the Bayfield County Invasive Species Coordinator Andy Teal.

Do you enjoy fun lake activities? Want your children and their children to enjoy them too?

The quality of lake life and fun is entirely dependent on us – on our water quality (and controlling invasive species).

Your Lake Association board is hard at work on this – but we can't do it without more of us working to protect our lake and our fun in it.







Background: The Healthy Lakes Initiative program, initiated by the Wisconsin DNR, is dedicated primarily towards reducing and eliminating harmful chemicals and biomass runoff into our lakes. Stormwater runoff from driveways, roofs and lawns contribute to lake contamination. Solutions to minimize such runoff include storm water diversion ditches, rock pits or trenches to capture and infiltrate water into the ground, rain gardens and shoreline vegetation. The "Fish Sticks" projects also provide feeding, breeding and nesting areas for all sorts of native critters - including walleye and song birds – and prevent bank erosion, protecting your lakeshore and enhancing water quality. #### Recent results of Lake Nebagamon work is promising:

- We've been recognized by the DNR as a flagship example of HLI local leadership and property owner participation. In April, we joined a statewide HLI focus group to provide feedback on program improvements, including a possible "ambassador" program.
- Locally, 21 of our lakeshore properties have and are participating in the runoff mitigation in the first three grants rounds – many with multiple projects- and many others of your neighbors have installed fish sticks (the walleye fingerlings are thriving!)
- We've just received our 4<sup>th</sup> grant, for 4 more properties. This again provides 75% of the funding for this work and our Lake Association provides another 15% (participant may be able to avoid a cash outlay completely by providing their own labor).

#### **Boat Ramp Updates**

In the fall we reported a project in conjunction with the Village and the DNR to improve the boat launch pad and have our biggest Healthy Lakes program to date with rain diversion and infiltration pits. Last year, the NLA contributed \$1,000 towards the initial study. These projects have now advanced into final design phases. Through the continued design, the size and scope of the project expanded significantly as engineers considered what was necessary to handle a good size rainfall (ie. 2 inches). The new project will feature a tiered rain garden instead of infiltration tanks, along with improvement to the concrete boat launch pad.

With the significant size/scope of the project comes a significant cost. Next steps are for this to be considered at the Village Board level for the 25% share that they would be responsible for. Then, a grant application with the final plans would need to be submitted for a 75% cost share from the DNR, which would happen over the coming winter. Should these steps be successful, the project could begin as early as next spring. We will provide further updates as they become available.



#### **Boat Parade July 4th**

Join your neighbors for the annual July 4<sup>th</sup> boat parade again this year. The parade starts at 7 p.m., and is led by Jack Sellwood (look for the teal-colored Bennington). The parade usually lasts about 45 minutes. All types of boats are welcome to take part. We will again be taking pictures of the festivities and determining which boats have the best combination of decorations, spirit, and creativity. The top two winners will receive a Dilly Bar for every person on board. Pictures will be shared on the NLA Facebook page as well as in the fall newsletter, as space allows.

# From the Nest of the "Loon Ranger," Dan Takkunen

Two of the awesome stars of Lake Nebagamon are some fascinating creatures, our loons and our eagles. How many times have you taken a pontoon ride, cruising around Honeymoon Point to view the eagles in their enormous nest? Or have you headed over to the bay east of the village to catch a glimpse of the loons and hopefully observe their chicks as they grow and mature throughout the summer? Have you had the chance to watch the eagle chicks, as they squawk for food or take flying lessons? If you look closely at the nest on Honeymoon Point, you may notice that the nest gets slightly bigger each year. A typical nest is about 8 feet wide and 13 feet deep. And it weighs an incredible one ton, on average. Let's hope that big pine supports it for a long time.

Other than the fact that they are both from the bird

family, there are few similarities between the loons and the eagles. The loons on our lake (one pair with two chicks, and a floater last summer) entertain us with their swimming skills and their haunting calls. Surveys by Loon Rangers on other Douglas County lakes indicate that other lakes have about the same number of loons as we do each year. Our lake is large enough and adaptable enough to support more than one pair, but we've rarely seen more than that over the years. It's quite remarkable to hear about a documented case of a banded Loon that flew 670 miles in one 24 hour period, just to get back to the lake where it was born!

We've heard stories about our resident eagles as well. An eagle was seen swooping down to grab a dead fish laying on a dock. In another observation an eagle was seen flapping its wings in a swimming motion to get a large fish to shore that it couldn't lift. Eagles can lift about 4 pounds, so that must have been a pretty big fish. An eagle's vision is 4 times better than ours, so their spotting abilities are excellent. Unfortunately for the loons, they sometimes spot a loon chick and attack it.

So, as you cruise around the lake this summer, hopefully you'll see the loons and the eagles. Respect them, give them their space, and most of all appreciate and enjoy them. Have a great summer!

### **Fishery Enhancement Initiative**



We have had great success with enhancing the fishery of Lake Nebagamon dating back to 2011, with over 60,000 walleye stocked. These walleye fingerlings came as a result of local lake owner fundraising, local businesses, the Red Cliff tribe, and the WDNR. In June 2019, committee members Phil Takkunen and Will Kiefer will be meeting with Scott Toschner of the DNR to set a plan for the next five years. This plan will be all-inclusive for different types of fish, and will include lake

stocking, keeper limits, and habitat. A walleye stocking is hoped for this Fall. To hear more about this initiative and to provide your input, please attend the annual meeting or contact Phil Takkunen at 949-412-8690
